2Q25 results at first glance

กำไรปกติ 2Q25 เพิ่มขึ้นเล็กน้อย q-q ดีกว่าคาดของเรา แต่ต่ำกว่า BBG consensus คาด

Highlights

- WHAUP รายงานกำไรสุทธิ 2Q25 ที่ 141 ล้านบาท ลดลง 36.5% q-q และ 57.4% y-y ต่ำกว่าที่คาดจากผลขาดทุน FX สูง โดยหักผลขาดทุน FX ออก กำไรปกติอยู่ที่ 232 ล้าน บาท เพิ่มขึ้น 12% q-q แต่ลดลง 41% y-y สูงกว่าประมาณการของเรา 8% จากรายได้ และส่วนแบ่งกำไรจากบริษัทร่วมที่สูงกว่าคาด
- รายได้รวมเพิ่มขึ้นทั้ง q-q และ y-y แม้รายได้จากธุรกิจสาธารณูปโภคลดลง จากลูกค้า IU
 ในกลุ่มปิโตรเคมีในนิคมอุตสาหกรรม WHA บางส่วนยังคงเดินเครื่องต่ำกว่าปกติ แต่มี
 รายได้จากค่าธรรมเนียมการขอใช้น้ำเพิ่ม (excessive charge) ภาคธุรกิจดาต้าเซ็นเตอร์ที่ เพิ่มขึ้น
- ส่วนแบ่งกำไรจากบริษัทร่วมเพิ่มขึ้นทั้ง q-q และ y-y จากโครงการแม่น้ำด่งในใน
 เวียดนาม หนุนโดยปริมาณการใช้น้ำที่เพิ่มขึ้นจากการขยายพื้นที่ให้บริการ
- ขณะที่กำไรจาก IPP ในบริษัทร่วมลดลงจาก GHECO-1 ที่ขาดทุนจากผลกระทบเต็มไตร มาสของตันทุนถ่านหินที่สูง และการหยุดซ่อมฉุกเฉิน 6 วัน ส่วน SPP margin อ่อนตัว จากตันทุนก๊าซและค่าไฟฟ้าที่ลดลงเล็กน้อย
- ใน 2Q25 WHAUP บันทึกผลขาดทุน FX ที่ยังไม่เกิดขึ้นจริง 90 ล้านบาท จากสินทรัพย์ สุทธิ USD ที่ขยายให้บริษัทร่วม สืบเนื่องจากค่าเงินบาทอ่อนค่า

Outlook

- กำไรปกติ 1H25 คิดเป็น 41% ของประมาณการกำไรสุทธิทั้งปีที่ 1,300 ล้านบาท (+21% y-y) ทำให้ประมาณการกำไรสุทธิทั้งปีมีความเสี่ยงปรับลง ดังนั้นเราจะพิจารณาทบทวน ประมาณการอีกครั้งหลังการประชุมนักวิเคราะห์วันที่ 15 ส.ค. 2025
- คงคำแนะนำซื้อ โดยมองว่า WHAUP ยังมีโอกาสเติบโตแข็งแกร่ง หนุนจากการขยายตัว ต่อเนื่องของธุรกิจนิคมอุตสาหกรรมในกลุ่ม WHA ซึ่งยังไม่ได้รวมอยู่ในประมาณการ ปัจจุบัน.

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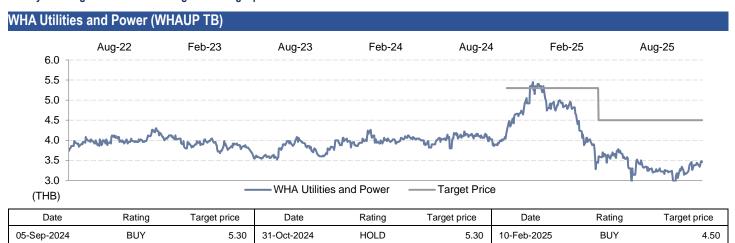
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History of change in investment rating and/or target price
